Clelia Mora is Professor of Hittitology and of Ancient Near Eastern History at the University of Pavia (she was associate Professor of Ancient Near Eastern History from 1992 to 2001 at the same University). In addition, she taught Ancient Near Eastern History from 2001 to 2008 at ‘Università Cattolica’ (Milan) and was an invited professor at ‘Ecole Pratique des Hautes Etudes’ (Paris) in 2009. She directed the ‘Consiglio didattico di lettere’ (University of Pavia) from 2002 to 2008 and the Department of ‘Scienze dell’Antichità’ (University of Pavia) from 2009 to February 2012. She is coordinator of the PhD School of Ancient Mediterranean Civilizations at the same University since June 2009.

Clelia Mora is also member of the scientific board of the Center for Cooperation and Development (CICOPS) – Pavia University.

Her main subjects of research include: Hittite history during the last phase of the Imperial age; political and cultural relationships between Anatolia and northern Syria in 14th-13th centuries B.C.; the Assyrian-Hittite relations; studies on Hittite administration; Anatolian Iron Age documents; origin of Anatolian hieroglyphic writing and documents in Anatolian hieroglyphic writing. In these research domains she has written four volumes, more than 120 publications (on national and international journals or book) and has edited ten volumes; she took part in the organization of ten national and international meetings.
